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#### Rebuilding Belfast

A series of vibrant devotionals is currently taking place in the Windsor/Village area of South Belfast. These devotionals, each with a different mood and atmosphere, allow for creativity and flexibility in the approach we are taking to teaching in the area. We have learned that hosting a devotional is a very simple act of service that can easily become a stimulus for growth. In September 2011 we had one devotional with around five regular participants per week. We now have three different devotionals, three study circles, a junior youth group, and a potential children's class, with over 30 individuals participating on a weekly basis, in a geographical area that can be traversed in a 15 minute walk.

We are beginning to see cohesion among the core activities, with our friends joining us in our efforts to transform our community. As a result of this, "a nascent programme for the sustained expansion and consolidation of The Faith can be perceived". (UHJ Dec 2010, Para 4)

## Progress in Seven Valleys



The Seven Valleys cluster has been busily beavering away these past few months. There are regular activities in four localities. Our tireless servants in Magherafelt have been holding regular devotional meetings which turned into a Book 1 study circle in the autumn. The Ballymena area holds regular devotionals, study circles and a junior youth group. The Coleraine area, despite having lost many of its longstanding Bahá'ís to other far flung lands has maintained a steady level of activity and two declarations in the past three months.

While the training was interrupted with Colin's sudden passing, you can be assured that this group will pick up this training in the near future with renewed ardour and dedication to advance the empowerment of junior youth throughout the cluster, a group so dear to Colin's heart. We do ask for everyone's prayers for the strengthening and growth of this cluster over the coming month, particularly in its efforts to maintain and advance the junior youth group in Ballymena.


